Those present enjoyed tasty lunches even with the longer lines, possibly due to much-increased patronage with the ConocoPhillips merger, as well as the fact that it was the first day of the new menus!

President Jim mentioned the possibility of making Bartlesville an official "Bicycle Friendly" city. He will find out more about this (download the application to check it out) – may have to present to mayor, etc. (Wal-Mart does have an outdoor bike rack now!)

Shirley suggested we get our brochures out in the community where new residents can learn more about the Pedalers. She offered to take them to the "Y," Fitness Center, etc.

Jim had a form for the Community Calendar to advertise any local activities to go in the first quarter brochure. A brochure with this information will be well-distributed in our area. Oklahoma FreeWheel 2003 Planning Report



Normally, nice is defined as above 40 degrees with no rain, mist, snow, high wind, etc. (But this is subjective!) Pedaler Profile:

Robert Booth

I was like most kids, I had bicycles – a Western Flyer my dad bought me when I was six years old and, when I was about thirteen years old, I bought a Montgomery Wards bike. It was black with side baskets so I could deliver my newspapers! Once, I think I was about nineteen years old, I rode my Dad's Schwinn 3-speed to a girl's house in the country. I think round trip was eighteen miles!

But if I would have to give one definite time that started me bicycling, it would be 1982 at the Tulsa Run. While standing on crutches in the lobby of the Williams Center (I had an accident at work), Frank Shorter came up to me and said to me "I always look at what injured runners are wearing, shoe-wise, so I can avoid those shoes!" Well, to make the story short, I told him doctors had told me I wouldn't be able to run. He told me I might try bicycling to stay in shape!

My first bike was my father-in-law's. It was a Sears, gold with chrome fenders! I got to where I could ride about fifteen miles a couple times a week. Then I found a Schwinn LeTour that the owner had wrecked. This was about 1984. With help of a bike shop in Independence, I got it fixed

up. I rode that bike until 1992 when I broke the frame at the bottom bracket. I then got a Mongoose "hybrid." All this time, I rode only during good weather and probably about 400 miles a year.

Then in 1998 FreeWheel came to Coffeyville and I went out the park to see the bikers. I started "training" and eventually bought a Cannondale. Four FreeWheels and several centuries later, I now ride year around – about 4600 miles this year!

This year I rode the Grand Tour of Colorado. It almost killed me.

One of my most memorable moments was while riding the Grand Tour of Colorado as we rode to the top of Red Mountain Pass in the rain. We were told the road was closed due to a mud slide. While waiting for a van to pick us up and take us the back way to Ouray, Colorado, the lady at the reststop said she was told they had one lane of the road opened. There was about four inches deep of mud on the road and they said we could walk through if we wanted. I told her I paid good money for the ride and that I was going down that mountain. I was glad I did as the sun came out and that last 12 miles was the most beautiful part of the trip. There were waterfalls and the sun was shining on the high crags – it was breathtaking.

After the Grand Tour of Colorado I said I would not ride it again, but just like I did on my first FreeWheel, I'm planning on riding it again next year! This year I rode with the club a few times

and really enjoyed it. Because of my job as deputy sheriff, I have to work every other weekend, so I'll try to come to the rides when I can.
