Oklahoma Fall Bike Festival

On a beautiful fall Thursday, October 10th, Bob and Patsy Lummis together with Dale Munn took the three-hour journey to Fairview, Oklahoma, for the Fall Bike Festival. Having spent enough time setting up tents in the dark with the Boy Scouts, we managed to arrive around 6 pm so that we could set up in the day light. We found Specht park and picked out a great camping spot. It was amazing to be able to set up a tent without any wind! We were looking forward to three days of discovering the Fairview area on bicycle.

After getting a good nights sleep (very few zippers going off, only a few coyotes howling), I got up Friday morning with some prodding from Bob about 7 am to a dense fog. Wanting to be able to see where we were going, we first went to Frank's Country Kitchen for a leisurely breakfast (there was limited staff). If I remember right we made it out of camp around 9 am with encouragement from Patsy as she headed off for the antique stores. Within the first hour we saw our only sunlight for the trip. There was a wide selection of routes available: 24,40,60,81 or 102 miles. Our selection was the 60 mile route which went through Okeene, Ames and Ringwood. Shortly after we left the sky clouded up and the wind came up from the south. The route first went south and finished by going north of Fairview. By the time we hit the south leg back to Fairview, the wind was very brisk (20 mph). The terrain was really good for cycling as there were only minor hills - they didn't even have numbers associated with them. After getting back to camp we took a very hot shower, visited the Major County Historical Society Museum and had a super potato dinner. Concluding the



day was a camp fire where we had s'mores and met other riders.

Friday night was pretty windy all night. Saturday we got an earlier start but it looked like everyone in camp was already at Frank's, so we had to settle for Sonic. The forecast was for a wind change from the south to the north and temperatures dropping later in the day. With this in mind we selected a 46 mile ride from the options of 26, 46, 58, 85 or 106. We road south to Southard where we headed west about the same time that the wind changed to northerly. During this part of the ride we were treated to very unusual road kill: two porcupines and a not so dead rattlesnake (maybe). By the time we reached Canton the wind was howling from the north. Part of the route included riding north east across the Canton Lake dam. I thought I was never going to make it, the cross wind was really treacherous. We must have averaged close to 8 mph for the last two hours back to Fairview bucking the strongest head wind I have ever experienced.

In view of the weather forecast for Saturday night and Sunday, we decided to break camp and *Continued on page three*

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A letter from the President

One of the reasons I started riding with a bike club (back in about 1976) was socialization. I've found it much better to ride and talk to someone as I go (also another great reason to tandem). Besides, you can learn so much by listening to what the experienced riders are doing and saying. I learned the importance of toe clips on one of those early rides as I watched others climb a hill that ate me up. I learned how to spin a high cadence and save muscles for a long ride. We even talked about mundane things like chain lube.

Have you noticed though that there are some things you shouldn't talk about on a ride? The most famous is the guy who brags about how long it's been since he's had a flat. My experience shows that this is the guy you do not want to draft behind unless you can control your own bike very well,

are not easily scared by loud noises, and want to watch the fun when his tire blows completely off the rim. The other one I've noticed is giving away information about a ride your familiar with and others are not.

In the early nineties I was riding with a Bartles-ville Pedaler on FREEWHEEL as we approached Hominy from the west. I'd never been out there before, but I was riding with our mega-milage junkie who had never missed a FREEWHEEL and probably knew every cycling road in Oklahoma. A few miles out of Hominy, after we'd been climbing for what seemed like forever, my friend pointed out a relay tower at the top of the hill. "You know what that means?" he queried. Already delirious from the climb I said, "Huh?" Highest point, its downhill from here!" Just what I needed to hear.

Now I know there's never any friendly competition on these rides, but something snapped when he told me that. I rode on his left as we climbed. Not far from the crest he called, "Car back." My next cue. It was time. Ostensibly to move over for the car I jumped two gears and stood. But we were close enough to the top that I never let up, and when I reached the "highest point" and started down there was no way he could beat me into Hominy. Sometimes you just have to be careful what you say on a friendly ride.

Christmas Party is Dec. 10



My most vivid early remembrance was trying to get to my friend's house. He lived about two blocks away, on the other side of the busy state highway. I had just learned to ride and I didn't have my own bike. So I had to use an old one Mom had in the garage. That was probably a good thing. It was a lady's bike and it was way too big for me. I thought I'd found a hole big enough in traffic across the highway and I stood up on that bike hard to get to the other side. Everything looked fine when right in the middle of the highway the chain jumped off. I slithered the rest of the way across the road. I was unceremoniously riding the top tube of that huge lady's bike and dragging my feet behind.

That's probably when I decided I needed my own bike. Move forward to Second Grade: the deal was, get all A's and you'll get a bike. I never worked so hard on grades. Then the report card. Oh NO, a B?!? "But Mom, how 'bout all these A+'s? Don't they make up for one B? I still don't know how, but I convinced Mom. Mom convinced Dad that it did balance out. Boy that was close.

Then Dad had to take me shopping. I wanted the first bike I saw (a red department store bike), but Dad wasn't convinced. I think it took days of shopping, but we finally ended up in a Schwinn shop and I got not just a bike, but a good bike. A red 24" Schwinn single speed with a coaster brake. It was beautiful. There have been other bikes over the years, but I guess there was something special about that first Schwinn.

News from America Bikes 10-21-02

Here's the latest from America Bikes headquarters in Washington DC.: Thanks for being part of the effort to convince Congress to include good bicycle and pedestrian provisions in the 2003 reauthorization of the federal transportation funding bill (aka the renewal of TEA-21, or TEA-3...what a mouthful!). 
ELECTIONS APPROACH

Find out what Congressional candidates are saying about bicycling! Over 125 candidates have responded to a survey by America Bikes. http:// americabikes.org/surveys.asp So far, 86% of respondents "strongly agree" that transportation choices such as bicycling and walking are important to their communities. 91% support a Safe Routes to School program. When asked if investments in new and existing road and transit facilities should accommodate safe bicycling and walking, 76% strongly supported the idea, and another 21% somewhat supported it. While it's true that candidates that support bicycling are more likely to respond to a bicycling survey, the results still show a strong level of support. Contact <mailto:survey@americabikes.com> for a copy of the survey. America Bikes strongly encourages everyone to get involved in the final days of the electoral campaigns, and don't forget to VOTE!

WHAT DOES EVERYONE WANT?

On September 19th, the House asked the major players in reauthorization to outline their priorities. Most testifiers agreed that the current structure of the legislation is working. Most of the highway folks focused on the need for more money and suggested a variety of strategies, including raising the gas tax or borrowing against future revenues.

They also focused on "streamlining" of environmental reviews so projects can be built more quickly. The Surface Transportation Policy Project included America Bikes's legislative priorities in

INDUSTRY AND ADVOCACY TOGETHER AT INTERBIKE

Many from the advocacy community traveled to Las Vegas in early October for the big industry trade show. Advocacy was a hot topic as the industry and advocates join forces to get more people on bikes. Over 150 retailers and industry representatives pledged to assist the America Bikes campaign by endorsing our agenda, and agreed to contact their Congressional delegation.

At the industry awards ceremony at Interbike, America Bikes board chair Elissa Margolin (also the Executive Director of the League of American Bicyclists) was named "cycling's woman of the year" and America Bikes board member Gary Sjoquist (also of Bikes Belong and Quality Bicycle Product) was named "individual advocate of the year."

GREAT GATHERINGS IN SEPTEMBER

In early September, 70 top advocates gathered in Minnesota for the Thunderhead Gathering and then joined 400 allies at the ProBike/ProWalk conference. America Bikes is working closely with advocates in 27 key states or districts whose members of Congress will have significant say in the *Continued on next page*

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new legislation. Most of those advocates, or "hubs," were in attendance, so we talked extensively about organizing grassroots support.

It gives me great comfort to know we have so many committed people on the team. Plus, I rode in the inaugural Oberstar 100 with the most avid cyclist in Congress as Congressman Oberstar completed his first century at age 67. Wow!

HOW YOU CAN HELP

The outcome of the November elections will have a huge impact on what TEA-3 will look like, as both houses of Congress could switch hands.

WHAT'S NEXT?

America Bikes will have its formal policy booklet completed by the end of the year. We anticipate that versions of TEA-3 will be introduced in Congress as early as January. The current legislation, TEA-21, expires at the end of September 2003, but no one expects the new legislation will be passed by then, so count on this campaign running through at least the end of 2003. Susan Klasmeier joined the America Bikes staff last week as our Program Manager. Yahoo!


